- 2. <u>Privilege the voices</u> of Indigenous communities and underserved groups.
- 3. Mobilize resources to take action regarding the needs they share.
- 4. <u>Invest in knowledge mobilization</u> to engage and share with these groups and other stakeholders.

The big picture...

Diversify public health and healthcare.
